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

During the past year I was greeted with the words, "My great aunts were Religious Sisters who were principals at St.

Paul School." I felt very grateful for the information the young woman offered me. She also handed me a donation from her father for St. Paul School. When I hear things like this, I feel very proud and grateful for St. Paul School and the way it has blessed many alums with fond memories.

Not too long ago, Peggy Fitch, our Coordinator of Religious Education at St. Paul, shared her thoughts about Catholic Education. She mentioned how fortunate she was to attend Catholic Schools in grades 1-8. Friends, Families and Supporters,

School has had a wonderful start to our 115th year of educating the minds, bodies and spirits of all the children. Our

students have been busy using 21st-century skills to better prepare them as productive members in the community. We continue to pride ourselves not only on what we are responsible to teach the children but also how we teach the children of Saint Paul School.

This year the school faculty is wrapping up a two-year self-study which is the initial part of the accreditation process for Catholic schools. In 1994 the Bishops of Ohio formed the Ohio Catholic School Accrediting Association (OCSAA). The OCSAA is a collaborative undertaking of the Catholic dioceses in Ohio and is governed by the superintendents of schools from each diocese in Ohio. The purpose of the OCSAA is to strengthen Catholic school identity and to engage Catholic schools in the ongoing improvement of student learning. This takes place through the accreditation process that follows a six-year cycle. The first two years of self-study are followed by four years of implementing. The years of implementation are formed around two goals that involve the Catholic identity and the academic performance of the school.

Throughout this year, Saint Paul School will be presenting data to show how we performed toward meeting the goals set in the last OCSAA cycle as well as data that proves where we plan to go in the next accreditation cycle. An administrator from the Diocese of Youngstown will complete an internal review. This will be followed by a two-day visit from a team of principals in which they will complete an external evaluation. Once that is complete, the school will consider any suggested adjustments before submitting our entire plan to OCSSA in Columbus for final acceptance.

We ask for your prayers of strength and guidance as we continue to work through this process to merit reaccreditation for Saint Paul School. I also thank you for your continued support of Saint Paul School. Your support makes it possible for us to be here in the community for our 115th year to provide a Catholic education for the children in Salem and the surrounding communities.

St. Paul School is a dynamic place. In addition to the reaccreditation process that is underway and discussed in the principal's letter, many other activities and developments of interest to the St. Paul School Family have taken place in 2018. Samples of them are reported below.

Building Upgrades and Changes

Changes, improvements, and additions to the building during the past year include:

- Preschool expansion to the entire lower level of the school.
- A second security door at the main entrance.
- A new heating and cooling system in Scullion Hall, thanks to the generosity of St. Paul parishioners and a grant from the diocese.
- Hallways freshly-painted in brighter colors.

Recruitment and Fundraising

St. Paul School worked to expand public awareness of its programs beyond Salem in effort to recruit students. During 2018 the school staffed booths at the Canfield Fourth of July celebration, the Columbiana County Fair, the Canfield Fair, and other shows and festivals.

Several fundraising activities were held throughout the year:

- Chevy Cruze raffle and car show (September)
- Race for Education (December)

On May 4th, St. Paul School will hold its third benefit auction. This major fundraiser will have many different items available for bid. Donations of small items like gift cards or big items such as event tickets or overnight stays are welcome. Please plan to attend and help make this a success. It will be an evening filled with fun, laughs, and good cheer, with several hundred members of our St. Paul School Family for a very worthy cause!

Student Population by the Numbers

Enrollment for the 2018-2019 school year is 107 students, preschool through grade six, a six percent increase over last year. The increase comes in spite of the difficult decision to cut grades seven and eight due to low enrollment and to reduce costs. At the other end of the student population, St. Paul now offers all-day preschool where there is a waiting list to enroll.

Diversity is increasing among the student body. Whites (non Hispanic) (77%), Hispanics (13%), Native Americans (4%), multi-racial (3%), and Asians (1%) are represented. Catholics make up two-thirds of the student population.

Sixty-three percent of students receive tuition assistance. The aid comes from friends of the school and St. Paul parishioners known as 'tuition angels,' the Loyal Christian Benefit Association, the St. Paul School Foundation, and the State of Ohio EdChoice Scholarship Program. Annual tuition is \$3,300 per student for Catholics and \$4,800 for non Catholics.

Student Well-being

Mr. Larry Truzzie, MED, is now a part-time counselor at St. Paul to assist teachers to support students and to help students cope with factors that may affect their ability to learn. Daisy, a therapy dog in-training, also visits the school to help meet students' emotional needs. She enjoys the smiles and belly rubs that the students give her. STREAM Curriculum

St. Paul School recognizes that preparing students for STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) careers is not enough. St. Paul takes this a step further by offering a STREAM curriculum that integrates religion and arts into STEM. STREAM emphasizes our spiritual and academic priorities.

These 2012 St. Paul graduates shared a total of \$6,900 in financial assistance for their first year of college education. Sydney, Gus, and Kate attend Youngstown State University; Zach is enrolled in the University of Akron; Georgia goes to Ohio State and Seth to Cleveland State. High school seniors who graduated from St. Paul School are eligible for the scholarship. Awards are based on academic achievement, grade-point average, church and community involvement, three letters of recommendation, an essay that describes an applicant's educational and career plans, and the role of a St. Paul School Catholic education in their academic success. The foundation takes pride in helping these graduates and encourages them to return often to St. Paul. Discovering and Celebrating Our St. Paul School Family

Cince its beginning in 1904, an estimat-Jed 4,000 students have walked the halls of St. Paul School. These alumni, along with current and former staff, parishioners, donors, relatives and friends, proudly share a common bond as members of the St. Paul School Family. They are scattered in 45 states, two territories, the District of Columbia, and in seven foreign countries. Since 2000, alumni have celebrated St. Paul's 100th (2004) and 110th (2014) anniversaries; held an all-class reunion (early 2000s); enjoyed annual alumni newsletters (starting 2006); followed the St. Paul School Alumni and Friends Facebook page (beginning 2009) and the St. Paul School Foundation Facebook page (starting in 2018); and organized several 50-year class reunions.

Creating the First Alumni Register

For most of the school's history, a list of alumni did not exist. That changed in the mid 1990s when Barbara Clary, a foundation trustee at the time, spearheaded the effort to compile the first register of alumni names and contact information. She achieved this by tapping the memory of other trustees who identified St. Paul alumni in the database of Salem High School graduates that is maintained by the Salem High School Alumni Association. (Class records prior to the early 1990s have not been located at St. Paul School. Individual student records have been unavailable because of privacy rules.) Rita Joseph O'Leary, a former foundation trustee and St. Paul graduate, and Patricia Bauman, a longtime St. Paul teacher and principal from 2006 to 2012, later enhanced and maintained the original register. Following these early efforts, the alumni of our St. Paul School Family stood at about 1,700 names.

Taking the Register to the Next Level

By 2011, the register needed a significant update. Foundation trustee John Paul Tolson, SPS 63, Mary Walpert Mayo, SPS 1963, dozens of other alumni and their relatives, current and former St. Paul staff, and friends of St. Paul School, have worked diligently to achieve the goal of locating every St. Paul School alum. For the past seven years, a daily effort has tried to keep alumni contact information current and expand the alumni register with the names of all former St. Paul students to help increase alumni support. Personal contact with hundreds of alumni, friends, parishioners, teachers, relatives, and others has been the primary means to accomplish this. Class photos have also

been useful. Online lists of Salem High graduates were again used to help those trying to recall the names of their St. Paul classmates. Efforts were also made to identify students who went to high schools such as West Branch and United Local or who moved from Salem while attending St. Paul. While the process has been arduous, the alumni now stand at over 3,400 names, double the size of early registers, and a reason to celebrate our St. Paul School Family!

Finding Alumni

Discovering whether alumni are living or deceased and acquiring contact information are the most difficult aspects of this work. For many alumni, especially those who left Salem long ago, it can be tedious and time-consuming. Online locators,

obituaries, social media profiles, and Internet searches make it easy in some cases. Clues such as parent names or where a family lived in Salem in references like the Polk Directory or old phone books are sometimes necessary. Contact with those who may have knowledge of former students often helps to uncover their whereabouts. As of October 2018, the list of those who are unaccounted for has been whittled down to 45 names, just over one percent of identified alumni. However, some individuals who have been asked repeatedly for information about former students now run the other way when they spot the St. Paul alumni hunters!

As gratifying as it is to find a longlost member of the St. Paul School Family, parts of the process can be unsettling. A few find the hunt for contact information intrusive. Searches sometimes expose hardships, alienation, and disharmony that families endure. One individual from the 1960s revealed how St. Paul was a refuge from the daily turbulence of family life.

When former students have been located and contacted, most expressed surprise and appreciation that someone made an effort to find them. Many willingly shared experiences of their St. Paul days, both good and bad. Occasionally, some asked for no further contact. But reaching out to hundreds of alumni has helped to re-awaken their memories and elevate their awareness of St. Paul School. A friendly and engaging conversation with a former student who has just been located after many years makes the search worth the effort and a reason for celebration.



While in part autobiographical, the text primarily follows the author's increasing spiritual devotion and religious practices as he grew more aware of his own mortality, following the deaths of his brother and mother-in-law in 2014. Joe explains how he weaves daily Mass and Holy Communion, praying the rosary, devotions to the Divine Mercy, Eucharistic adoration, First Friday and First Saturday devotions, monthly confession, Marian consecration, and daily holy card and scriptural readings into his routines. The narrative is copiously referenced with citations from a four-page bibliography of spiritual and religious works and articles.

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
