Dear Alumni, Former Students, and Friends of St. Paul School, and St. Paul Parishioners,

Many good things have happened at St. Paul School in the past year. Former students, current and former staff, parents, grandparents, and friends celebrated the school's 110th anniversary as a beacon of Catholic education in northern Columbiana and southern Mahoning counties. Enrollment increased for the first time in a number of years. A successful marketing effort boosted the school's visibility in the community. The first St. Paul School golf scramble raised nearly enough money to cover annual tuition for two students. And St. Paul School continued, with renewed vigor, to educate the minds, bodies, and spirits of children whose families value faith-centered education. On a sad note, Anthony DeCrow, Jr., one of the driving forces to establish the St. Paul School Foundation and its first president, passed away in March. His vision and foresight are paying huge dividends today as the foundation serves an expanding role in financing school operations.

When the foundation was established in 1990, its emphasis was to provide financial support for academic programs and capital improvements that enhanced students' educational experience. At that time and for many years, foundation trustees viewed school operational expenses to be covered by tuition, the parish subsidy, and other sources of school income.

However, since 2008 the role of the foundation has, out of necessity, evolved significantly. It has now provided a portion of school operating funds for five

of the last seven years. The foundation is blessed with financial resources to meet expenses left by the school's income gap. But the foundation's resources are not limitless. St. Paul School will need ongoing financial assistance in order to continue offering children of the Salem area a faith-based elementary education.

Please consider a generous donation to the school or the foundation that is commensurate with your means and the role that St. Paul School has played in your life. This might be for receiving a solid scholastic or faith foundation, for nurturing what has become a life-long friendship, or for finding inspiration from a favorite teacher. Ten suggestions for providing financial support are listed on page 11. Online giving is now available. Your contribution will be deeply appreciated and put to good use.

So much has happened at St. Paul in the last year that the 2014 edition of this newsletter has expanded to 12 pages. We hope you will read and enjoy its contents, and that they bring a sense of pride for being part of the 110 year-old St. Paul School family.

Foundation News

School Support 2013-2014

For the 2013-2014 fiscal year, the foundation contributed \$92,120 in direct support of St. Paul School, its students, and staff. Of this total, \$50,000 went to school operations—salaries, benefits, building maintenance, and utilities—and \$25,000 to tuition assistance, a 108 percent increase from 2012-2013. These two amounts accounted for 12 percent of the school budget. Including the current (2014-2015) fiscal year, the foundation has helped the school meet shortfalls in revenue from tuition, the parish subsidy, and other income during five of the last seven years.

Last year's support also included \$5,000 for a school-wide technology upgrade and \$12,120 for school marketing and staff appreciation. Since 2004, the foundation has contributed nearly \$550,000 in direct support of school operations, academic programs, students-in-need, capital improvements, and building maintenance.

Anthony DeCrow, Jr., '64, a driving force to create the St. Paul School Foundation, died at his home in Salem, Ohio, on March 20, 2014.

Anthony's concern for St. Paul School led him and 14 other charter members, with encouragement from then principal Mike Marshall, to establish the foundation in 1990. It was founded in honor of his father Anthony DeCrow, Sr.

One year before his death, Anthony discussed the foundation's history. He explained that the founders were motivated by a commitment to Catholic education and a desire to improve the school, provide financial stability, and give students a better educational experience. Hundreds of St. Paul students and friends have benefited from this legacy.

Anthony graduated from West Branch High (1968) and Youngstown State University with bachelor's (1972) and master's (1976) degrees in business.

His mother, Libby DeCrow, daughter Sarah Zerbs, '97, son Anthony (TJ) DeCrow III, '98, siblings Joe DeCrow, '62, Loretta Connolly, '68, and Steve DeCrow, '69, and his former wife Lynn DeCrow survive. May his soul rest in the peace of Christ.

In May, the foundation awarded \$10,700 in financial assistance to nine 2014 high school graduates for their first year of post-secondary education.

School News

Enrollment Increases

The number of students attending St. Paul for 2014-2015 grew by five over last school year. Enrollment from preschool through grade six stands at 99. Though modest, this increase is significant. Principal David Pancurak attributes it to:

- Word-of-mouth. Parents have noted a renewed dedication at St. Paul to fulfill its mission to educate the mind, body and spirit in an enjoyable learning environment.

- Community outreach. Mr. Pancurak visited 13 preschools in a 10-mile radius of St. Paul in early 2014 to ask that parents consider sending their children to St. Paul kindergarten. Mr. Greg Arcuri, a member of the St. Paul School Foundation and the parish finance council complemented this by promoting St. Paul School at surrounding parishes. In addition, Math Night at Salem Giant Eagle and STREAM Night at the school helped to increase community awareness of St. Paul.

- School tours. Outreach efforts spawned inquiries from interested families that then visited and toured St. Paul.

- Social media. Photos of students’ classroom work, field trips, community

involvement projects, and religious activities were posted several times a week on the St. Paul School Facebook page.

These efforts will continue in order to increase enrollment in the 2015-16 school year.

Students Travel to State Geography and Science Competitions

Three St. Paul students qualified for two state-level academic competitions last spring. Colleen Bungard contended in the state geography bee, while Jacob McLachlan and Nicholas Scarpitti vied in the state science day sponsored by the Ohio Academy of Science. Both were held in Columbus, Ohio.

Miss Bungard, a sixth grade student, won the school geography bee and passed a written exam to earn the right to compete in the state capital. Jacob won first place among fifth graders for his project on how dissolved salt affects the density of water. Nick was tops in the sixth grade class for his project on designing and racing computer robots. Both were selected to participate at the regional science day at

Youngstown State University where each received superior ratings, earning Jacob and Nick a trip to Columbus.

St. Paul School Celebrates 110th Anniversary!

Over 120 parishioners, current staff, former students and teachers, and friends of St. Paul School gathered in Scullion Hall (the school gym) on August 23, 2014, to celebrate the school's 110th anniversary of its founding in 1904. The gathering was hosted by the St. Paul School Foundation. Mrs. Gina Dermotta, foundation board member, a class of 1979 graduate, and a staunch advocate of Catholic education served as chairwoman of the event. Mr. Frank Zamarelli, class of 1976 and president of the foundation, emceed the celebration.

"Every year that St. Paul School is open is a celebration of Catholic education," said Mrs. Dermotta. "We are so fortunate in the Salem community to have a Catholic preschool through grade six with increasing attendance. It is a symbol that families are making a commitment and a priority for their children to come here. Having the dinner is a great opportunity to celebrate and visit among alumni, friends and former staff members. I can't say thank you enough to all that helped to put this celebration together."

During the program, Mr. Zamarelli, provided an overview of the foundation's work. David Pancurak, school principal, discussed technology upgrades in classrooms, improvements to security, and an increase in enrollment for the first time in a number of years as a result of an aggressive marketing and outreach effort. Guests watched a video of The Most Reverend George V. Murry, SJ, Bishop of the Diocese Youngstown, speaking of the value of Catholic schools. As they socialized before dinner, those in attendance also enjoyed perusing tables filled with old photos and school memorabilia and viewing a slideshow of recent school activities assembled by Mr. JC Williams, the school computer and art teacher.

Zamarelli also recognized all St. Paul teachers, past and present, foundation board members, and former students in attendance. One was Matilda "Tillie" Hurray Tolson the oldest known former St. Paul student. Tillie graduated from St. Paul School in 1929.



Featured Teacher: Mrs. Clara Tolson, Kindergarten

As a young girl growing up in Lisbon, Ohio, Clara Tolson always wanted to be a teacher. Even while playing with dolls at an early age, she made believe the dolls were in school. When she attended school and observed teachers at work, she was inspired by many, but was certain she could do better than some to help each child learn and love school.

Clara Tolson has dedicated her career to teaching the children of St. Paul School. Since 1980, with a few years off to raise her two children, she has nurtured and educated over 600 St. Paul students. "I always loved children. I love their energy [and] enthusiasm... I understand the little ones," Mrs. Tolson

Faith Formation at St. Paul

They pray together as a school three times each day. They attend Mass as a student body weekly. Once a year each class makes a religious retreat. As second graders, they receive their First Reconciliation and First Communion. They participate in special events such as 40 Days for Life and the Mass for anointing of the sick. They are altar servers, lectors, and choir members. They are taught that living their faith means conducting themselves as good citizens and respecting others.

Faith formation and educating the

noted with a big smile in her brightly decorated classroom.

Though she began at St. Paul teaching first grade, most of her time has been as the kindergarten instructor. "I enjoy planning the activities and seeing the love of learning in the eyes of the children," she answered when asked what she likes most about teaching kindergarten.

There are challenges, too. Meeting the needs of each child in spite of all their individual differences is a demanding part of the job. So is the four to eight hours that she devotes each weekend to planning and readying materials for the coming week.

Mrs. Tolson holds a bachelor of science degree in early childhood education from Kent State University. But she is quick to credit her teaching and administrative colleagues throughout the years. "Each has helped me to become the teacher I am today," she stated. Her top role model is her mother

spirit permeate students' lives at St. Paul School. From scripture readings and classroom prayers at the beginning of the day to prayers before and after lunch, to reciting the Confiteor on the public address system prior to dismissal, there is a daily rhythm of prayer and faith at St. Paul.

Students receive religious instruction at a minimum for a half-hour daily. Each class covers the same topics, although some topics receive greater emphasis in certain grades, such as the Eucharist in grade two and the Commandments in grade five. Ten Ways to Support St. Paul School Financially

There are many ways to support St. Paul School financially. Several are even fun! This summarizes how to help the school meet its fiscal needs.

- 2. Donate directly to St. Paul School.** Donors known as ‘tuition angels’ give directly to the school for tuition assistance. Some give to meet other immediate needs. All donations are fully tax-deductible and can be sent to 925 East State Street, Salem, OH 44460 or made online by visiting www.stpaul.k12.oh.us/donate.
- 3. Donate to St. Paul Church.** A significant portion of the St. Paul School operating budget is provided by a parish subsidy. Parishioners can help to ensure that the church has sufficient funds for this subsidy by donating generously in the offertory collection each week. All donations are fully tax-deductible.
- 4. Donate to the St. Paul School Foundation.** The foundation provides financial support for the educational programs, facilities and students of St. Paul School. It is governed by a board of trustees. Unless specified by a benefactor that their donation be used immediately, gifts to the foundation are invested for long-term financial growth to benefit the school at a later date. Foundation funds are awarded upon a majority vote of the trustees at the request of the principal, pastor or a trustee. Since 2004, the foundation has contributed nearly \$550,000 to support St. Paul School. To donate online go to www.stpaul.k12.oh.us/foundation. Donations are fully tax-deductible.
- 5. Support fundraising by the St. Paul Home and School Association (HSA).** This group of parents sponsors five annual events—the Pasta Bowl, a 10-week raffle, a spaghetti dinner during Catholic School Week, an Easter candy sale, and a spring fling—to raise its annual goal of \$12,000 for the school. Much of this money supports fine arts activities. HSA regularly makes additional donations to the school throughout the year.
- 6. Support special fundraising efforts of St. Paul School.** The school itself sponsors fundraisers. Earlier this year a golf outing and a day to receive 15 percent of gross receipts at Bob Evans Restaurant were two such events.
- 7. Support special fundraising efforts of St. Paul Church.** The church sells gift cards for use at retail and dining establishments and receives a percentage of each sale. Parishioners are strongly encouraged to purchase these gift cards. The church also holds monthly raffles with prizes donated by parishioners such as Cleveland Browns tickets, dinner for two, and other prizes.
- 8. Make a bequest to the church, school, or foundation.**
- 9. Designate the church, school or foundation for memorial donations upon one’s passing.**
- 10. PLAY BINGO** on Tuesdays at St. Paul! Bingo generates between \$60,000 and \$70,000 annually for the parish. Half of the proceeds go to St. Paul School.
